With the arrival of spring there is much that I could write about. After all, there are a few important events happening at the Temple this month. There is the annual rummage sale (please volunteer) on April 6-7 and 9th; our Congregational Seder on Tuesday, April 11th; and a new event, an Open House for Prospective Members (we

hope some of our current members will attend also to help welcome folks and answer questions) on Sunday, April 23rd from 11am-1pm.

So, I could write about any or all of those but instead there is something else on my mind – a pregnant giraffe. Some of you may have seen stories about April, the pregnant giraffe at Animal Adventure Park in upstate New York. I understand that some of the major morning shows have been following the story. It may have shown up on your Facebook feed as a "popular video."

Sometime in February, they began to livestream the pen that April dwells in with the idea that people would like to watch the pregnant giraffe give birth in real time. I don't remember exactly when I started to tune into this stream but I think it was about a month ago. Now, lest you worry, watching the video is hardly a full-time preoccupation. I seldom look at it during the day but I mostly glance at the video before going to bed and sometimes as I'm waking up as well. Lately, as it gets closer to the time when April is scheduled to give birth, I've even peeked at it if I can't get back to sleep in the middle of the night (yes, I'm aware this is counter-productive for falling asleep). Watching the video has been a lesson in many ways and I thought I'd share a little about what it has taught me.

You can't rush life. It reminds me in some ways of Slow TV that I spoke of at the High Holy Days. There's not much to look at at any time. Just a giraffe

walking around her pen. And yet this scene has mesmerized thousands of people around the world. I have found myself occasionally frustrated that it's not going faster. It's the same with life, sometimes you just have to appreciate the moment you're in and stop wishing it to go faster.

Nature is amazing. Part of the reason that this has gone on so long is the nature of giraffes in general. Because of fear for their newborns, female giraffes, even those in captivity, are very good at masking their pregnancies. For this reason, it's very hard to tell if anything is happening. It's even led some people to believe that she's not really pregnant and the whole thing is a hoax. I find this remarkable that a giraffe could be in labor and hardly anyone, even the experts, know for sure.

You never know what is going to bring people together. One of the off-shoots of the livestream are the comments that people are making. I've been watching these as well. It's quite lovely to see people commenting from all over the globe. For the most part, the comments are nice and supportive. I even have a sense that some people have become friends as co-watchers of the main event. I have even seen people come together when a troller comes on and wants to get nasty. Mostly, the comments are filled with kindness and love for this giraffe. It's refreshing.

It's not a bad thing to be reminded that you're not always in control. Occasionally I have looked at this video and been a little angry that she hasn't had this calf yet. Why did they start the livestream so early if it was going to take this long (see #2)? Am I just being strung along? But then I realize that I'm not in control. If I'm going to get any enjoyment out of this experience, then I just have to let go and wait. This isn't to say that I'm fatalistic about life. But sometimes, it is important to realize what you have control over and what you don't. You can act on the former and have to learn to live with the latter.

All in all, I've enjoyed watching April and look forward to the excitement of seeing new life in the form of a baby giraffe as well as the rebirth of spring that we celebrate with our Pesach holiday.

The Temple Board met on March 8th. Andrea Levey led the D'Var Torah. Andrea's Torah portion contains detailed instruction for building and decorating the Tabernacle before the



Jews began to wander through the desert. Instructions were given to bring olive oil to light the Ner Tamid and God instructs Moses to make special clothes for Aaron and the priests. There is a seven day ceremony where they burned incense every morning and evening. Andrea felt that just as we ask God to fulfill our needs, God needs us to fulfill his needs. She also referred to a story of a blind man and a sighted man. The blind man asks the sighted man to kindle a light for him. Andrea took this to mean that everyone should help each other even people with disabilities.

Jim reported that the sanctuary renovation committee will meet in March. The committee members are: Jay Sklar, Jerry Paris, Larry Pearlman and Jim Gesmer. Brina Grigg will be the head of the nomination committee to find 3 members who will fill the open positions on the board. The annual Temple meeting will be on June 11th.

The Rabbi reported on her activities. She will be attending the CCAR Convention in Atlanta and is doing some midwinter planning for OSRUI. She led the 5th/6th grade retreat in which 2 students from our Temple attended. Rabbi attended 2 FAR meetings and the Temple Game Night. She conducted the funeral for Evalyn Schaap. Her community work includes attending a planning meeting for the 815 Choose Civility committee, participating in an interfaith panel at Highland Community College, attending the YWCA Leader Luncheon, and the RR Star Conversation on Race. Rabbi will attend the MWARR Study Kallah in Arizona where she will be elected President in 2018.

Sharon reported that our finances are ok since our two fundraisers are coming up. We will be receiving money from Savant. Brina reported that at this time we have 88 members. Rob felt that the Foundation is doing better than we have in a long time. In February the Foundation gained about 4.29%. Purim will be held on March 12th during Sunday school and the Passover Seder will be on April 11th.

The carpeting in the lower level will be replaced soon and the wall in the sanctuary will be cleaned and fixed. Lauren reported that the Sunday school students participated in music, art, and made hamentashen. Amira Ahles and Lilly Wing participated in the 5th/6th grade retreat at OSRUI. There will be no Sunday School, March 26th,29th, and April 2nd. The GRTY participants made lots of hamentashen. The Puppy Wash they participated in was a huge success. The GRTY led Shabbat will be on March 17th. The teens have been working hard on writing and practicing their service.

Karen reported that the Temple has donated about 2 bins of school supplies to Ellis School. The committee is looking to do a social action project called Laundry Love in the next few months. The board voted to give a one year dues free membership to people who join the Temple for the first time. This idea came out of the strategic planning that was done. It will start in 2018. It was also decided that an Open House would be held for perspective members on

This will allow easier access to tables during the lunch times. The rummage sale is also moving along. Flyers have been e-mailed and Wendy Huss will be sending out Sign-up Genius to ask for volunteers. Rummage will be accepted starting March 31st-April 4th. The art auction committee met in February and talked with Roni Golan to get his thoughts on having local artists for the auction. At the next meeting they will be discussing a theme, cost and venue. Ellen Dietz reported that the campaign has collected \$20,000 out of the \$21,600 pledged. Ohave Sholom members will meet at the Hellman home on March 5th to make Hamentashen, eat lunch and watch a movie. Rabbi Fertig will be staying at the Geller home from March 10th -12th for Purim. The next book talk will be on the book Once We Were Brothers. Details for the book talk are not planned yet. The Midway Village Cultural Heritage event will be on March 18th. March 19th will be another unity in diversity event. The combined Friday night service will be on April 21st. The Jeremiah Development Project will be on April 29th from 10-2. We will be pampering people who are needing help. The Holocaust Remembrance Service will be on April 30th at 4pm. The speaker will be Marian Blumenthal-Lazen. Prior to this groups of diverse people will meet from 1:30-3:30 at the Interfaith Cafe. This replaces the open houses at the different churches which happened last year.

There is a committee that is developing a Temple legacy giving program. They are creating a booklet that will explain legacy giving and develop a form for Temple members who decide to give to fill out. More information will be coming.


Dear TBE Friends:

Anything in life is possible if you want it bad enough. I appreciate the freedom we have in this country to pursue our hopes and dreams so freely. Life is truly what we make of it.

What is the best advice you have ever received?

The best advice I have ever received was from my Uncle Joey. His motto was, "there are no problems, only solutions." He always looked for the

positives and potential solutions versus dwelling on the negatives in any situation.

If you could take two weeks off from all of your responsibilities, where would you go and what would you do?

I would love to take my wife to Israel. I have been there twice and I would love to show her what a beautiful country it is and how friendly and warm the people are. I would be sure to include time in Jerusalem and all of the biblical sites in the land of Israel. To me, going back to Israel is like going back home.

Favorite Judaic food:

My favorite Jewish meal is a real kosher corn beef sandwich, with the meat carved hot off the brisket. Serve that on some seeded Jewish rye bread, accompanied by a bowl of piping hot chicken kreplach soup....and don't forget the pickles!



Do you know why Jewish people put stones on graves when they visit?

The custom is a very old one and there are different explanations. A superstitious explanation is that the stone keeps the soul down and keep them from haunting the living. Other explanations are more meaningful to us today. Flowers, while a nice symbol of life, eventually wither away. As it says in Isaiah, "the grass withers, the flower fades" (Isaiah 40:7). Memory on the other hand, is more permanent so a stone is a better symbol to remind the mourner of the permanence of memory and our enduring feelings of love for our dead. Additionally, it is a more lasting symbol that someone has been there and still remembers their loved one. Yet another lovely explanation is based on one of God's names in Jewish tradition, "Tzur Yisrael, "Rock of Israel." Thus we express our prayer that the deceased find peace in the embrace of Adonai and that God continues to be a source of strength to those who are bowed by sorrow. So we are comforted also by the ancient nature of the tradition as well as the symbol of permanence amidst the fragility of life.

BEAUTIFUL BAKED GOODS FOR FOOD-A-RAMA

Each Temple family is asked to bake something to sell in the Food-A-Rama bakery. You can bake cakes, strudels, cookies, pies, breads, whatever you like and as many items as you like. Cakes and pies usually sell for \$5-\$10. Cookies by half dozen sell for about \$2-\$3. Bakery Ideas: (Include some smaller portions for singles; for example, half a cake. Bar cookies (toffee, brownies, strudel, lemon bars, butter-scotch, etc.)

Coffee cakes (sour cream, cinnamon, pecan, etc.) Cookies (chocolate chip, peanut butter, Mandelbrot, rugelach) Cakes (chocolate, sponge, Bundt, poppy seed, carrot, pound, etc.) Pies (cheese, fruit, pecan) Breads/Muffins/Rolls: Any specialty you may have!

Here's an idea.... You could bake items from our cookbook. Identify the recipe and list the page number on the label.

Label each package clearly and in detail so we know exactly what the item is. The Board of health is requiring a list of ingredients (recipe not required).

Packaging: Make each package look pretty so it sells quickly. Foil pans enclosed in clear plastic baggies, tied with a twist or colored ribbon look attractive. Ask the butcher at your favorite store for some Styrofoam trays or keep the small plastic containers from purchased rolls or cookies. Cakes and Pies can be lightly covered with plastic wrap since we put them in boxes when they are sold. Breads should be wrapped in clear plastic so they can be seen.

Where and When to Deliver Baked Goods

Bring your items to the Temple on Tuesday, May 16th, the day before Food-A-Rama. Sign in at the bakery table. Leave your name and what you brought. If you cannot provide baked goods, we ask you to make a \$25 donation, but we hope you will bake since the community really looks forward to a full bakery table. They really do look forward to your goodies!


