Our **Local Color Art Auction** was held at Midway Village with an enthusiastic audience of 114 people, including 21 participating artists, Temple members and Rockford community members. Jon Rozman and guitarist, Ross provided a lively musical background as people ate, drank and viewed the amazing 97 pieces of art on display.

Thank you to our Art Auction committee: Barb Berney, money and I would careful-Jim Gesmer, Lauren Lamont, Patty Kaufman, Roni Golan, Jay Sklar, Wendy Huss and Mary Roufa. Thank you to our Auctioneer Dan Cohen, and to Larry Pearlman for his auctioneer wrap up along with the great pictures that captured the essence of our fun evening! A BIG thank you to our Youth Group members: Adam and Joe Gesmer, Ben Kopnick and Maddox Towne for their expertise arranging and labeling the art. Thank you to Natalie Deutsch, Madi Reid, Aaron Tatman and Jamie Zussman for keeping the art straight and schlepping art (some of them pretty big!) to the auctioneer. Local Color was a unique event partnering with Rockford community artists and splitting the art proceeds 50/50 with Temple and the artist. Forty percent of the art up for bid was sold, totaling \$10,000. Some of the pieces were sold with 100% of those proceeds donated to Temple. Our net profit was over \$5,000.

Our committee met the following week to talk about what was great and what needs to be tweaked. All in all the decision was unanimous to offer this fun event again next year!

One of the things that I remember about the Religious school experience of my youth was the giving of tzedakah. I remember that I would be given a few coins from my parents or from my own money and I would carefully place it in the class tzedakah box that was passed around each week. Perhaps some of you have

a similar memory. At Temple Beth-El, we still do this in our religious school classes (friendly reminder to parents of current students – please remember this important mitzvah!). What happens sometimes, though, is that we begin to think of this kind of giving as an activity for children.

This past week there was a major reminder in our American culture about giving. It's even called Giving Tuesday, complete with its own hashtag and everything. Perhaps you received many emails from organizations that you've supported over the years asking for funds on that day. For Jews, the commitment to giving extends throughout the year and throughout our lives.

The word tzedakah is often mis-translated as "charity," but that is really incorrect. The word comes from the Hebrew root for justice. That is to say, then, that giving, for us, is more about justice. It's also more of an obligation for us, an action we are commanded to do, rather than something we do because we might feel like it at that particular moment.

Which brings me back to our tzedakah box giving. Some of you may not even realize, or have forgotten, that we have a beautiful tzedakah box in the foyer of the Temple. The idea is that when people come to Temple for services, adult education, meetings, etc. that perhaps they'll put a few coins or even a few dollars in that box, just like we did when we were kids.

The Social Action Committee would like to increase the awareness of our Temple tzedakah box as well. Toward that end, they have decided to dedicate money placed in that box to different charitable organizations over the course of the year. Depending on how it goes, the money will be collected for one or two months per organization. The first charitable organization that was decided on is MAZON: A Jewish Response to Hunger.

MAZON is a fine organization that works on hunger issues in the Jewish community and far beyond as well. These winter months are for some, a time of great food abundance. We feast on Thanksgiving meals and Hanukkah as well. Our Christian friends feast on Christmas meals and enjoy special sweet treats all month. For this reason, especially, it is important to be reminded of those for whom there is little celebration foodwise and those who struggle with hunger all yearlong. It makes sense that MAZON would be our designated tzedakah organization for the month of December.

We'll keep you posted as to what organization is next. In the meantime, I ask that you make an extra effort, whenever you're in the building, to see the tzedakah box and fulfill the mitzvah of giving. Even a few coins, when added to others, can add up quickly.

In less than two weeks, we will celebrate the holiday of Hanukkah. At its heart, this holiday is about bringing light into the darkness. This echoes the mission of the Jewish people. Together, we will continue to do this important work.

May Hanukkah bring light into the darkness for each and every one of us.

From the Temple Board.... By Secretary Ellen Salley

The Temple Board met on November 8th, 2017.

Ellen Dietz based her D'Var Torah on the book, The Happiness Prayer – Ancient Jewish Wisdom, for the Best Way to Live Today written by Rabbi Evan Moffic. His book is meant to provide a way for people to be happier and is based on the prayer Eilu Devarim. This prayer was written over two thousand years ago and consists of ten verses. Each chapter in the book is based on one of these verses. For example, in order to become happy Rabbi Moffic says that you have to believe that your life has meaning and you are here on this earth for a reason. Rabbi also believes that you need to have gratitude for the gift of life itself. He goes on to explain each chapter and at the end of the book is a Happiness Quick Start Guide to help readers begin to live by the happiness prayer.

Jim had Jerry Paris come in and give an update on the progress of the campaign committee. He reviewed the other campaigns that were run in 1995 and 2004. The board will be discussing the committee's suggestions for running this campaign.

Rabbi attended various meetings, officiated at Ella Holmstrom's Bat Mitzvah, the funeral of Gunther Frank and participated in the vigil for slain police officer Jamie Cox. Then, she explained that an anti-Semitic poster was placed on the door by the classrooms. Rabbi called the ADL, the Sheriff's department, and filed a report. The Temple security system gave us a picture of the man and a good look at his vehicle. Rabbi is working on a project to bring Rabbinic students to Temple to see how a small congregation works. This could happen mid to late January.

Brian reported that the Hanukkah dinner will be December 16th. Ronit will be cooking chicken and the congregation will be asked to bring desserts and salads. Members will be making Latkes.

David and his volunteers took down and stored the Sukkah. ComEd came and removed the freezers that didn't work and we received a rebate of \$100. The Art Auction sign was put up and the sprinkler system was winterized. The oven in the kitchen has been cleaned. We still have to make roof repairs quoted at \$108,620. Security projects include repairing doors and locks, putting in window blinds for the classrooms and office, and putting in a tool crib pro-



By now, I am sure that you are aware of the hate crime that took place at Temple Beth-El earlier this month when a man posted an anti-Semitic flyer on one of the entrances. Fortunately, thanks to our so-

phisticated video surveillance system and the efforts of the Winnebago County Sheriff's Police, a suspect was soon arrested.

Please be assured that security remains a top priority at Temple Beth-El. Following the crime that took place earlier this month, the Board decided to hire a private firm to provide security during the ensuing Shabbat service and during the ensuing day of Hebrew School and Religious School. In addition, it has now been decided to keep the doors locked at all times during Shabbat services and during Hebrew School and Religious School hours. When you are assigned to be the Oneg host during Shabbat services, I am asking you to remain in the lobby for the first five to ten minutes after services start in order to open the door for any late-arriving people.

The Board will continue to monitor our security situation and implement any steps that we feel our necessary to keep our members safe. We have been in frequent communication with the Winnebago County Sheriff's Police since the hate crime took place, and we have requested increased patrols in our area.

Carol reported that the Sunday school students were busy with the fall holidays. They made decorations for the Sukkah, marched around with their flags on Simchat Torah, had music classes, and baked honey cakes with Ronit. They have had a school fire drill and will have a tornado drill. On November 3rd the students shared their Judaica at a special Friday night service. There will be no Hebrew on November 22nd and no Sunday School on November 26th due to Thanksgiving.

GRTY went to Camp Winnebago for a team building activity, apple picking and pie baking, and attended the Ben Hecht show on October 29th. Afterwards, Nanci presented the group with the Peace Builder Youth Award for their community service with the Rock River Valley Refugee Project. GRTY went bowling in November and will be going to Laser Quest and Sho Gun in December.

Karen delivered 250 pounds of food and \$1,856 to the Rock River Pantry from our High Holy Day drive.

Mary reported that about 90 people have said they are attending the art auction. She met with Dan Cohen to go over the job of auctioneer. Jonathan Rozman will be playing at the auction. Mary was very grateful for Barb Berney's help with the auction and especially the brochure.

Jay mentioned that we have two iPads that can watch the cameras but the WIFI does not work in all parts of our building. Jay made a motion to fix this problem. The board discussed the motion and it passed unanimously.

Ellen reported that the 2016-2017 campaign raised \$24,000. The Federation kick-off will be on November 19th at Mauh Nah Tee See Country Club. There are 40 people participating in Yoga classes and Zumba is just getting started. The Federation's annual meeting will be December 3rd at 10:30 with breakfast at 10:00. Ohave Sholom will host a scholar-in-residence, Rabbi Andy Shapiro Katz on Sunday December 10th and will have their Hanukkah dinner on Saturday December 16th.

Thank you Temple members for your generous contributions to the Rock River Valley Pantry. For many years, we have held a High Holy Day food and monetary collection to benefit those in the Rockford area that depend on the Pantry to supplement their food budgets. According to an article in the RRSTAR, the Rock River Valley Pantry provided more than 1.5 million pounds of food last year. This was enough food for 1.3 million nutritious meals for families, including children. Many of these meals were for individuals who were homeless.

This year, we at TBE collected 250 lbs of food and donated \$1856 (which includes \$250 from the Cy Sachs Fund)!. This surpassed last year's donations.! Thank you again, TBE and the larger Jewish community for understanding the real meaning of Tikkun Olam.



We would like to help them by providing school supplies to be used at the center and some for the children to take to school.



Jewish Federation Book Discussion January 21, 2018, 2:00 at Temple No Room for Small Dreams: Courage, Imagination, and the Making of Modern Israel

By Shimon Peres **Pages 240 ISBN-13:** 978-0062561442

Shimon Peres was one of Israel's founding fathers and for more than six decades was an architect of its ascent from a fragile state to a global power. In 1994, he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for his extraordinary efforts to forge peace between Israel and the Palestinians. In 1996, he founded the groundbreaking Peres Center for Peace and Innovation to focus on developing and implementing im-

aginative peace building programs around the world. Peres died in September, 2016, shortly after finishing his work on this book. He was ninety-three years old.

No Room for Small Dreams is a must read for anyone who is interested in the history of Israel. Peres's autobiography details his experiences, and importantly gives a first hand account of the history of Israel. This is truly a phenomenal book written by someone who lived the experience.

Please read, but even if you do not finish it, come to the discussion. The date is January 21, 2018, 2:00 at TBE.

- 6. What happened at Entebbe?
- 7. What does the title mean?




