Wow. November 2016 was certainly a dramatic month in many ways, perhaps one of the most dramatic months that I can remember in my lifetime. It began with the tremendous, earth-shaking moment of the Cubs World Series victory on November 4<sup>th</sup>. I can still scarcely believe that it happened! For those of us who are Cubs fans, either

"life-ers" or new-comers, Game 7 felt like several lifetimes passing before us. It is hard to put into words the sheer elation of that moment.

I'm sure you know what the other major event of November was – Election Day on November 8<sup>th</sup>. Some people were happy with the result. For others it was a very difficult night and the days that have followed have continued those feelings. I spoke briefly about the election on two of the Friday nights in November and I want to share the essence of what I said on one of those nights.

I reminisced about how when I first was hired by Temple Beth-El, it seemed that every Shabbat had a theme – Reproductive Rights Shabbat, National Volunteer Shabbat, Hunger Awareness Shabbat, Earth Day Shabbat, and so on. I made it clear that, while these issues were important, and that I might choose to speak about them, that we weren't going to officially label Shabbat. The theme of Shabbat, I asserted, is Shabbat which is about rest, joy and holiness.

Toward that end, I reflected that night, each Shabbat could be considered Election Aftermath Shabbat, in which we continue to discuss the latest goings-on with the government. I made it clear that I do

not intend to engage in this constant conversation. And the reason is because of the single conclusion that I came to which is this: Our clarion call as Jews is unchanged. Unchanged. It is as it has always been. The Prophetic call of our tradition is clear what we are to do. What is that? Come to the defense of the oppressed. Feed the hungry. Give clothing and shelter to those who are without. Protect the weakest of our society. Our tradition speaks of the widow and the orphan. While we mean that literally, it also means that we are to care for those who are alone, who may be more vulnerable because of their status, who may have problems, like a widow or an orphan, that they did not create that stem from who they are and situations in their lives that they had nothing to do with creating.

These are the tasks that our tradition has always stood for. That is what we need to continue to stand for. That is the work we have to continue to do. Nothing has changed except perhaps our sense of urgency to this work.

Toward that end, in the sermon, I referenced the idea of trying to affect our individual spheres of influence – *dalet amot* in Hebrew. This is about trying to make a difference in our own relationships and experiences. Maybe your *dalet amot* is in your home or your workplace. Maybe you are volunteering somewhere. Maybe you could start. Maybe it's just buying the coffee for the person behind you in line. We can continue to influence our world for the good if we continue to bring kindness to our own spheres of influence.

In a few weeks we will celebrate the holiday of Hanukkah. At its heart, this holiday is about bringing light into the darkness. This echoes the mission of the Jewish people. Hanukkah also speaks of rededication, commemorating the rededication of the Temple. This Hanukkah we need to rededicate ourselves to our clarion call as Jews – to continue to be a light unto the nations – bringing light into the darkness and making the world around us, even on the smallest level, better for everyone within it.

May Hanukkah bring light into the darkness for each and every one of us.

The Temple Board met on November 9<sup>th</sup>. Ellen Salley led the D'Var Torah based on the Torah portion Lech Lecha. This Torah portion is about God telling Abraham to



leave his homeland and go to a place where God will show him. God will bless him and make him a great nation. God is challenging Abraham's faith. Abraham is 75 years old when God challenges him and he has to decide if he is capable to take on the challenge both physically and mentally. Just like Abraham, we have to know ourselves and our capabilities as we face the challenges in our lives. Lech Lecha teaches us that if we have faith in God and ourselves we can overcome our challenges. Ellen read her son's Bar Mitzvah speech to the board because his Torah portion was Lech Lecha.

Jim reported that the fourth planning session would be at Mary Roufa's home. After the sessions, the board will meet to go over the findings. Jim thanked Mary and her committee for all the hard work they did on the Art Auction and the GRTY students who helped with the Art.

Rabbi led the Simchat Torah service ending it by singing "Go Cubs Go" in honor of the Cubs winning the World Series. She attended the second and third planning sessions and the Art Auction. She is still planning the fifth/sixth grade retreat.

Sharon gave the treasurer's report. Brina reported that the Finance committee is working on the five year plan and met with Scott Laue. Scott said that our average rate of return on our investments are around 7%. At this time we have 88 members. Rob reported that the Foundation lost-1.76% for the month of October but is doing fine for the year.

Andrea said that the Religious Functions committee decided to do a Hanukkah Oneg instead of a dinner this year since Hanukkah is so late.

Jordan reported that the parking lot will be fixed sometime this fall or next spring. A concern was brought up about the carpeting in the sanctuary. He will be looking into that. Jordan discussed other minor issues he is working on.

There were five new students consecrated at the Simchat Torah services. The Sunday school students were allowed to attend the adult education chocolate program and enjoyed it. They will be able to attend the Jewop program as well. Lauren thanked all the parents and GRTY members who made a record number (54) of pies



On behalf of the Temple Board of Directors, I want to thank all of you who participated in the Strategic Planning process. We have now held four Strategic Planning sessions, under

the guidance of Larry Pearlman, and I believe that we heard from a cross-section of our membership. The Board of Directors plans to meet with Larry for an extended retreat style forum, sometime in late December or early January. During the retreat, we will discuss the many views that were presented at the Strategic Planning sessions and discuss how best to move forward in order to strengthen our Temple religiously, culturally and financially. The Board will thereafter present its plan to the entire congregation.

If you were not able to attend one of the Strategic Planning sessions, please feel free to contact Larry or me in the next couple of weeks to give us your opinions about what you perceive to be the strengths and weaknesses of Temple Beth-El. Your comments are most welcome.

The next time you come to Temple Beth-El, please take a look at the rear parking lot near the dumpster. That area of the parking lot has long been in need of repair. Thanks to the efforts of Jay Sklar, Jordan Towne and Ben Holmstrom, that work was completed in November. We can now feel at ease when the garbage truck drives over that part of the parking lot to empty the dumpster.

Finally, on behalf of the Board of Directors, I want to wish everybody a happy Chanukah. Please join us at Shabbat services on Friday evening December 30, 2016, to celebrate Chanukah and to nosh on some latkes.
