arrival of spring in the Jewish world. We celebrated Purim at the end of February this year and that means that Passover will soon be upon us!

It's been a couple of years since this happened but this year the 1st night of Pesach is a Friday evening. While many Jewish observances take place in the synagogue, some, like Shabbat dinner and the Passover se-

der were meant to take place in our homes, which our tradi-1st Seder tion also holds as a sacred space. In fact, the Rabbis considered the home as the main location for expressing our Jewishness. No holiday emphasizes this more than Pesach. For some people, their most meaningful Jewish memories are of Passover seders in their family homes.

The Rabbis envisioned the Jewish family as the foundation of Jewish life, and no holiday more than Pesach enshrines this value.

falls on a Friday night (March 30), we will not be having **Shabbat** services here at Temple.

The extended family including loved ones and friends gather together in the home to reenact the most important event that happened to the Jewish people: the Exodus from Egypt and the beginning of our life in covenant with God.

These days not everyone has a seder in their home. Some people only go to the congregational seder on the second night of Passover. This is a nice tradition that allows us celebrate the holiday as a community. However, our tradition challenges us to make sure that everyone is able to celebrate Passover at home - either in their own, or the home of a family member or friend.

Since we value the role of the family so much in our tradition, we would again like to try and match up people who want to attend a seder with people who are hosting a seder. If you would like to attend a 1st night seder, please contact me at the Temple. Likewise, if you are having a seder and would be willing to welcome a few more people to your table, please let me know that as well. Don't worry if you have small children or if you don't follow the haggadah letter for letter. It's the togetherness and welcoming others that is important! In this way, Pesach can be celebrated by all who wish in a way that respects tradition and the central role of the home in our Jewish lives.

Also, because 1st Seder falls on a Friday night, we will not be having Shabbat services here at Temple. If you have a yahrzeit that would be read at services on March 30th, please call the office to have the name of your loved one moved to a nearby date. If we don't hear from you, we will read the name on March 23rd.

I look forward to hearing from you and celebrating with you on the 2nd night of Passover, Saturday March 31st!

From the Temple Board.... By Secretary Ellen Salley

The Temple Board met on February 14th, 2018. Brina's Torah portion is Parashat T'rumah which contains instructions on building the Mishkan, or place of worship, while the Jews were in the desert. The in-



structions were exact and easy to follow including the building of the Menorah. The modern-day seal of Israel depicts the Menorah as it was 12 years after the destruction of the Temple. Yet Maimonides offered a version of what he thought the Menorah should look like and Rashi seemed to agree with him. Although they probably got it wrong, it was due to the instructions that our ancestors had in their heads which they did not fully communicate. Brina pointed out that this kind of miscommunication can happen in modern times because of e-mails, texts, and the spoken word. It is important to pay more attention to our communication and how it can be interpreted. The real lesson lies in how we handle the miscommunication. The lesson is to reserve judgement when a miscommunication happens. Instead of placing blame, we need to ask ourselves was the communication clear? Jim gave condolences to the Rabbi on the loss of her mother on behalf of the board. He reported that the nominating committee needs 3 members for the upcoming election of new board members. The board members will be Jay Sklar, Jim Gesmer and Brina Grigg. The lay leaders are still needed.

Rabbi reported that there has been no Torah on Tap since October but that she plans on starting up again in March or April. The fifth/sixth grade retreat at OSRUI was cancelled due to the weather. Rabbi is now a member of the new committee to address antisemitism in Rockford. She attended the first two sessions of antiracism leadership training along with Faye Marcus. She will be working at OSRUI this summer, so she attended a mid-winter meeting for the faculty. Rabbi expressed her immense gratitude for the love and care she received from the Temple family due to the loss of her mother. She will be spending some time taking care of her mother's estate.

Sharon reported our total income and our expenses. A question was asked about what we do with the money in the library fund. Jay said that the money is used to buy books. Right now, we do not have a librarian to purchase books. Jay is going to try to update the computer on the contents of our library and investigate e-books. Brina reported on our receivables and total pledges of our 85 member units. The next finance committee meeting will be on February 20th.

Rob reported on our Foundations as of January 31st. In January, we had a gain of 3.03%. Rob said that although we have had fluctuations due to the market volatility, we are still doing pretty good.

Brian reported that the committee is planning for the Passover Seder which will be March 31st. There will be no Friday night services on March 30th.

David reported that the interior doors and locks have

From my perspective, David and Jordan are probably at Temple Beth-El more often than anybody except Rabbi Wing, Jay Sklar and Joyce Hulstedt. I know that David and Jordan volunteer their time out of a desire to make our building as energy sufficient and as durable as possible. Next time you see David and Jordan, please thank them for all that that they do. I hate to think what the state of Temple Beth-El would be without their hard work.

been repaired. The classrooms and office will have oneway mirror film put on them for safety. David met with Nicor, and after an assessment we qualify for \$1,167 in potential rebates and \$609 in annual energy bill savings. David is working on incentive programs from Com Ed. If we qualify we could receive between \$20,000 and \$30,000 in incentives. The Temple HVAC and roofing projects could qualify for 7 different incentives and 2 bonus/discount programs. Hopefully, this project will start after Food – A – Rama. David and his family did a great job of cleaning up the boiler room. The boiler had a tune up which should be done every 3 years.

Carol's report stated that Sunday School resumed in January. The older students listened to the adult education program on humor. The students had music and decorated flower pots to plant seeds for Tu'B'Shevat. They also watched the movie, "The Lorax" to reinforce the holiday. There is money available from the Dermer and Garten Fund for Religious School students to attend OSRUI. All the students will be attending the Jewop performance on February 18th.

GRTY students spent time reflecting and providing everyday examples of how they could better uphold their Jewish values. They then watched the movie "Miracle at Midnight". This movie showed the sacrifices and danger Danish citizens faced while trying to help their Jewish neighbors.

Karen reported that the school supply drive for Rock House Kids finished. Karen and Faye dropped off about \$325 in donations and a check for \$115. The agency was very appreciative. The wine and paint night on February 15th has 11 people attending. Karen is looking for a host for a Spring social.

Mary said the committee is gearing up for the Rummage Sale. Members can bring in their rummage starting March 15th. To volunteer to help, there will be a sign-up genie. Jordan Towne cleared out the books in the classroom.

Jay reported that the 1914 legacy packet will be mailed out in the next few days.

Ellen reported that the 2017 campaign collected \$24,600 out of the \$28,000 pledged. After receiving another donation, the total sent to Hadassah Hospital for Parkinson's research was \$560. The Lox Box profit was \$1,674.24 including a \$180 donation from Meijer. Yoga brought in \$331. The Synagogue will celebrate Purim on February 28th and the Purim Carnival will be held on Sunday, March 4th. The ADL is bringing 2 speakers on March 11th to speak to the youth group and adults. Midway Village Heritage Day will be on March 17th. Thirteen immigrants were taped for their display and Goldie was one of them. The Holocaust Remembrance Service will be at the University of Illinois School of Medicine on April 8th. The next Israel at 70 event will be a dinner followed by a talk by the Golans on Saturday, April 21st. Brian Shore brought up a way to fix and decorate the foyer with stained glass. He presented what the glass panels would look like. He volunteered to do all the stained

glass and put it up. The board accepted Brian's offer after discussion.

hoping to have another painting night during the summer. Stay tuned! Hope many more people will give it a try!






