I've chosen to highlight in this space is Rockford Promise. You may have heard about it recently in the news or in the newspaper.

Rockford Promise is a location-based scholarship program. In partnership with Rock Valley College and Rockford University, they give full-cost scholarships to RPS graduates so they can attend college debt-free. Modeled after successful programs in Kalamazoo, Pittsburg and other communities, the goal of Rockford Promise is to make post-secondary education affordable and expected for students in our community. Promise programs - which guarantee funding for every public school graduate in their local community have been proven to show positive results:

- Increasing the percentage of low-income students, and students of color, who finish High School and start and complete post-secondary education.
- Increasing academic performance, especially for students who otherwise might not attend college.
- Reducing discipline issues and improving attendance.
- Increasing property values and the desirability of the location - tuition-free college can make people choose to live in your community and attend public schools.

Wouldn't we be thrilled if all these things would happen in our community! Rockford Promise gave five full-tuition scholarships last year. You can learn about these amazing students at rockfordpromise.org. They are students of enormous potential. Next year, they hope to double that number, and keep increasing it after that. At the moment, they are focusing on students who live in Midtown and Ellis Heights - in alignment with the United Way Strong Neighborhoods. As soon as they raise enough, they'll expand these areas, until all of RPS is included.

They've been identified as a key project of Transform Rockford. The School Board, RPS Superintendent, Presidents of Rock Valley College and Rockford University, city leaders and state legislators have all given their strong support for this effort. As graduation season will be on our minds, it is a great time to share our wealth and build a sustainable and strong culture of education in our community. A Morning with Elie Rekhess

With all the propaganda surrounding Israel, it is important that the Jewish community know the facts. Elie brings a unique perspective of being both a Zionist and an expert on the Arab minority living in Israel. It is an honor to have Elie Rekhess speak in Rockford.

Elie Rekhess The Legitimacy of the State of Israel: Historical Perspectives Sunday, June 4, 2017 10:00 Breakfast / 10:30 Presentation



Professor Rekhess (Ph.D Tel-Aviv University) is one of Israel's leading experts on the Arab minority in Israel, Jewish-Arab relations, Palestinian politics, and Islamic resurgence in Israel, the West Bank, and Gaza. Until his

retirement in 2011, he served as a Senior Research Fellow in the Moshe Dayan Center for Middle Eastern and

African Studies, Tel Aviv University, and headed the Program on Jewish-Arab Cooperation in Israel sponsored by the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung (1995-2010).

As of 2013, Prof. Rekhess holds the position of Crown Visiting Professor in Israel Studies at Northwestern University. He teaches in the Department of Jewish Studies as well as in the Department of History at Northwestern. He organized the inaugural conference entitled "The Zionist Ideal in Israeli Culture: Dream and Reality" in November of 2013. In October 2015, he organized the international conference at Northwestern University "Between Baghdad and Haifa: A Tribute to Israeli Author Sami Michael." He established the NU Israeli Film Club in partnership with the Chicago Festival of Israeli Cinema in 2015 and hosted the first of a series of screenings in 2016.

He recently authored, edited, and co-edited: Muslim Minorities in non-Muslim Majority Countries: The Test Case of the Islamic Movement in Israel (2013), The Arab Society in Israel: A Compendium (2009), Arab Youth in Israel: Caught between Prospects and Risk (2008). He is currently completing two manuscripts, one on Islamic Fundamentalism in Israel and another on Communism and Arab Nationalism.

Prof. Rekhess has held a variety of central advisory posts, including Senior Consultant on Arab Minority Affairs to the Prime Minister's Office under Itzhak Rabin (1993-1994); Senior Consultant on Arab Affairs to the Histadrut Labor Organization (1994); strategic advisor to Ehud Barak during his election campaign (1999) and as an advisor to Science Minister Matan Vilna'i, Chairman of the Ministerial committee on the Arabs in Israel (1999-2000); Senior Consultant to The Abraham Fund Initiatives for the Enhancement of Jewish-Arab Coexistence (1994-2008); and Member of the Board of "Sikkuy," the Association for the Advancement of Equal Opportunities (1993-2006).

Elie Rekhess married Ankie Spitzer, widow of Andre Spitzer, who died in the Munich massacre in 1972.

Did you know why some Jews observe Jewish holidays for a different amount of days than other Jews?

This goes back to a time when we didn't have the kind of speedy communication that we have today. The beginning of the holy day was marked by the sighting of the moon in Jerusalem (often the full moon as many of our holy days occur on the 15th of the Hebrew month when the moon is full). Then, through a series of shofar blasts or other communication such as lit flame torches, word spread that the holy day had begun. Then, when Jews began to live outside of Israel, they had to estimate when the beginning of the holy day was occurring. To make sure that they observed the festival for the proper amount of time, an additional day was added. Thus, in the diaspora, Jews began to celebrate one-day holidays such as Rosh Hashanah and Shavuot for two days and 7-day festivals such as Sukkot and Passover for 8 days. When the State of Israel was established, it became the custom there to follow the biblical length of the holidays instead of the diaspora custom, returning to the sorter length. Reform Judaism made the decision to follow the same custom as the State of Israel although many congregations and individual Reform Jews will sometimes still follow the diaspora custom of adding an additional day. There are two interesting exceptions. In Israel, Rosh Hashanah is still observed for two days. This is because the diaspora custom had become so important and entrenched in people's practice that Israel retained the extra day. The other exception is Yom Kippur. No matter where Jewish people live, they only observe Yom Kippur for one day instead of two. And we're all grateful for that!!

One of the most important purposes of Food-A-Rama is to open our Temple to the Rockford community and share our gastronomic delights with them, but we want to be able to purchase those goodies, too. You will be receiving an order form with a list of Food-A-Rama foods and their prices. Fill it out and return it to the Temple if you want to preorder these goodies and reserve them for your family at special pricing on many items.

FOOD-A-RAMA TICKET SALES

Soon, you'll be getting seven tickets to FAR in the mail. Please sell them. The price is \$11.00 each, and the lunch is worth every penny. Remember, Turkey Pastrami is now an option, too! Call the Temple office if you need more tickets. Please do not get them from other Temple members, as it confuses the records. And please send in the ticket money as soon as possible. If you can't sell all your tickets please return them to the office.

BEAUTIFUL BAKED GOODS FOR FOOD-A-RAMA

Each Temple family is asked to bake something to sell in the Food-A-Rama bakery. You can bake cakes, strudels, cookies, pies, breads, whatever you like and as many items as you like. Cakes and pies usually sell for \$5-\$10. Cookies by half dozen sell for about \$2-\$3. Bakery Ideas: (Include some smaller portions for singles; for example, half a cake. Bar cookies (toffee, brownies, strudel, lemon bars, butterscotch, etc.)

Coffee cakes (sour cream, cinnamon, pecan, etc.) Cookies (chocolate chip, peanut butter, Mandelbrot, rugelach) Cakes (chocolate, sponge, Bundt, poppy seed, carrot, pound, etc.) Pies (cheese, fruit, pecan) Breads/Muffins/Rolls: Any specialty you may have!

Here's an idea.... You could bake items from our cookbook. Identify the recipe and list the page number on the label.

Label each package clearly and in detail so we know exactly what the item is. The Board of health is requiring a list of ingredients (recipe not required).

Packaging: Make each package look pretty so it sells quickly. Foil pans enclosed in clear plastic baggies, tied with a twist or colored ribbon look attractive. Ask the butcher at your favorite store for some Styrofoam trays or keep the small plastic containers from purchased rolls or cookies. **Cakes and Pies** can be lightly covered with plastic wrap since we put them in boxes when they are sold. **Breads** should be wrapped in clear plastic so they can be seen.

Where and When to Deliver Baked Goods

Bring your items to the Temple on Tuesday, May 16th, the day before Food-A-Rama. Sign in at the bakery table. Leave your name and what you brought. If you cannot provide baked goods, we ask you to make a \$25 donation, but we hope you will bake since the community really looks forward to a full bakery table. They really do look forward to your goodies!

Here we go. The 55th Annual Food-A-Rama. Thank you for making it a success!
